Re: CRIME BULLETIN: Residential Burglary (459 PC, Case 24-031)

The Sonoma State University Police Department is investigating a residential burglary that occurred on February 13, 2024, between 5:30 and 6 a.m., in Tuscany Village. Property from the residence was taken, but was later recovered at a residence in the city of Rohnert Park.

Additionally, a female suspect was taken into custody and booked into the Sonoma County Jail.

We are seeking community assistance to locate any witnesses who may have seen this suspect yesterday morning in the area of Tuscany Village around the time of the burglary. The suspect is described as a white female adult, 37 years of age, 5' 7" tall, weighing approximately 145 pounds, with light-brown shoulder-length hair, multiple ear piercings, and wearing a sweatshirt and possibly jeans.
